

Swiss job creation model develops skills and knowledge among Serbia's youth

Through a network of local partners, this youth employment programme provides funding for career guidance, counseling, internships, trainings, and work-based learning



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The vision of the Education to Employment (E2E) programme is to provide decent job prospects for all young women and men in Serbia regardless of their social status. This vision is achieved through the promotion of modern active labour market and skills development measures based on the Swiss model and adjusted to local needs.

Bringing together key stakeholders involved in youth employment from the Serbian Government, the private sector and civil society, E2E aims to create a long-term, sustainable municipal-level system to increase youth employability and create a dynamic, modern and adaptive labour market in Serbia.

In modernising Serbia's youth employment policies and increasing the competence of young labour through work-based learning programmes, the goal is to achieve a better matching of the demand for and the supply of work in the private sector.

The project is operational in the municipalities of Novi Pazar, Knjaževac, Pirot, Kruševac and Kragujevac where it tests labour market interventions for increased youth employability that are replicable in other Serbian municipalities. To have a higher impact in the 2nd phase, the geographical coverages are planned to be expanded to surrounding territories of partners or "brokers".

Network of local partners

In order to help the youth efficiently prepare for jobs that meet private sector needs, the E2E created a network of five local partners. These so-called "brokers" act as mediators and bridge-builders between training providers, companies and youth - setting up a system that will serve the community long after the

project comes to a close. Local partners offer services such as provision of labour market information, training programs, practical guidance and vocational counselling in school-to-work transition and mediation of work-based learning (WBL) opportunities such as internships for youth.

E2E partners work to develop public-private development partnerships (PPDP) at the local level with companies, local government and training providers to develop and expand a market for non-formal trainings with work-based elements that fits both the needs of the private sector and young people.

Modern work-based learning opportunities

E2E creates WBL opportunities for young job-seekers from selected regions of Central-South Serbia. As a result, they are better able to position themselves on the labour market through employment promoti-





To this end, E2E promotes modern trainings in companies, career counselling and other labor market measures (provision of labor market information, job search and traineeship placement assistance) that increase the chances for young people to enter and pursue a career.

Working with government to improve policy

E2E's unique “bottom-up” approach allows the programme to work in local communities and then feed findings and know-how to the government through its Social Inclusion and Poverty Reduction Unit (SIPRU), which advocates changes in the youth policy framework practices. As a result, relevant national and local key stakeholders can apply effective and evidence-based policies on youth employment and employability through increased performance capacities and a diversified funding portfolio.

The PPDP assists Serbia in applying successful elements of Swiss and other EU cooperation models in the field of dual vocational education training, non-formal training market, work integration/social inclusion of disadvantaged groups and labour market mediation.

In addition to SIPRU, E2E involves collaboration with the Cabinet of the Prime Minister; the Public Policy Secretariat; the Ministry of Labour, Employment, Veteran, and Social Affairs; the Ministry of European Integration; the Ministry of Education, Science, and Technological Development; the Ministry of Youth and Sport; the National Employment Service; the Institute for Improvement of Education; the Qualifications Agency; the Chamber of Commerce and Industry; the Standing Conference of Towns and Municipalities; and various municipalities.

Working with vulnerable groups

The project emphasises work with vulnerable social groups, such as domestic violence victims, young offenders, Roma, rural youth, refugees, returnees etc. Each municipality tests ways to include a different group and works toward identifying a nation-wide, replicable model with optimal results.
